

AUGUST FUN FLY

It was one of those dog days of summer where everyone wished they were in a place that was cooler, but an enthusiastic group gathered for the Club's August Fun Fly. The Fun Fly started with its' usual lunch of hotdogs, sodas and chips procured by John Woods and cooked by chef Erv Rohde. And as usual there were contributions of beans, cakes and cookies by the ladies that everyone appreciated. After lunch it was on to a short pilots' meeting and into the first event.

The first event was a Carrier Landing. Three squares were lined up. Land in the first or third one and get five points, land in the middle square and get 10 points. Each pilot was allowed two attempts with no restarts. There was a three way tie for first place—Bud Austin, Howard Shire and John Woods each got 10 points and Don Johnson was fourth with 5 points. The other two participants did not score on their first attempt and no one was able

to score on their second attempt or even make a second attempt.

The second event was an Egg Drop. Attach a foam cup to your plane, place a weighted plastic egg in the cup, take off and drop the egg on a target on the runway. Closest egg to the target wins. Fritz Corbin was the only pilot that could get a legal drop on the runway at 35 feet and took first place, The other four participants tied for second and split the Top Gun points for second, third, fourth and fifth place. At this point everyone decided it had gotten too hot to continue so packed up and went home.

Overall there was a three way tie for First Place with Bud Austin, Howard Shire and John Woods each getting 115.8 Top Gun Points. Fritz Corbin was Fourth with 113.3 points and Erv Rohde Fifth with 55.8 points.

The next and final Fun Fly of the year is scheduled for October 14th.

Below are a couple of shots of Homer "Zip" Zobel's new Tribute. The unique thing about this plane is the force generators (extra fins) in the wings. This extra side area is supposed to make the plane handle better in knife edge flight and 3-D maneuvers. Zip is learning how to take full advantage of this feature. These force generators can also be slipped out and replaced with inserts that match the wing airfoil.
