

#### **MEETING MINUTES**

TRI-LAKES R/C FLYING CLUB November 9, 2004

President Howard Shire opened the meeting at 7:33 p.m. at the Branson Community Center. All officers were present. There were 20 members present and two guests, Cathy Metzger & Erv Rohde's son-in-law David from Michigan. The minutes from the October meeting were approved as published in the November newsletter. Erv Rohde eported that the treasury balance as of November 1st was \$923.91. The 50/50 raffle was won by Cathy Metzger who received ½ of \$11.00.

Committee Reports: Officer candidate Chairman, Gary Acton, presented a slate of candidates for 2005 Club Officers. President-Gary Acton, Vice-President-Bud Austin, Secretary-Annette McEvoy and Treasurer-Erv Rohde. Other candidates can be nominated up until nominations are closed at the December meeting.

Announcements and Old Business: Everyone was reminded that the normal starting time, when the meeting is held at the community center, is 7:30 p.m., the exception will be next month's meeting and Christmas party which will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The October fun fly certificates were handed out (along with a couple for previous events to Joe Major & Don Livermore). Overall event winner was Mike Anderson; 2<sup>nd</sup> place Erv Rohde & Bud Austin taking 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Mike Anderson announced that he finally got a price for the cost of having the hats embroidered instead of screened. It will cost \$60.00 just for the screen, however the cost of the hats should be a little lower than in the past. It was decided

that Erv Rohde will contact the company that we previously ordered from and place an order. He has also taken over the shirts from Mike so anyone needing a hat or shirt should contact him.

**New Business:** Jack McEvoy announced that Annette's Bookkeeping Services will be donating a \$25.00 gift certificate from TPA Hobbies as a door prize at the December meeting. Winner must be present to win.

**Program:** Annette McEvoy displayed a 1/4 scale pilot made from a DGA kit purchased from Sig. Kits are available for \$11.95 in 1/3; ¼; 1/5 & 1/6 scale. You paint the latex head, gloves, boots, hat that are supplied and sew the body and clothing if you can figure out the poor instructions that come with it.

Larry Glizer brought an electric IMAX motor.

Don Johnson demonstrated his Micro Flyer by Wattage. It weighs about 1 oz and can be flown indoors or out. Comes complete with everything except batteries for \$40.00.

Jim Halbert brought his latest invention, a 1½ meter scratch build Excide motor glider that is partially glassed. He also had a metal grease strainer (can) that he picked up from Wal-Mart, figures that it would work great as a safety container for Li-poly batteries. Jim also displayed a bipe that started out as a kit but had such poor wood, etc. that he scrapped it and just used the prints. He covered the wings with balsa, stretched the fuse 3" and it should be under 30 oz with almost 600 square inches of wing.

Don Livermore gave a talk on jet aircraft, what makes them tic, what the different types and options are and what it takes to get into this phase of our hobby. The beautiful Bob Cat that he brought for display was built by Terry Nitch and has Bob Violette timed retracts, air brakes, steering gyro for control on the ground and has a power to weight ratio of about 1.1. Jets can fly as slow as 35 mph or up to 250 mph however AMA has a 200 mph limit. He discussed some of the other safety requirements AMA has including how to obtain the turbine waiver you must have in order to fly. This was an extremely interesting and informative presentation.

Meeting adjourned at 8:41 p.m.

It would be nice if all members that enjoy flying at the field would also be involved with some other activity that supports the Club.

Our Associate member from Springfield, Don Livermore, paid us a visit at the November meeting and brought his new toy. It is a Bob Cat from a Bob Violette kit, built by Terry Nitch. Shown above is the turbine engine that bolts on behind the fuselage. The black cylinder to the left of the turbine is an electric motor used to spool up the turbine to starting speed. In the center picture is some gear used to operate the turbine. There is a controller that takes over the starting sequence, spools up the turbine, turns on the glow plug, gives it a shot of propane to start and then turns on the kerosene fuel. It then turns control back to the transmitter throttle control. It also has retracts and automatic emergency fuel cutoff. So! What does it take to have one of these little beauties? Well the turbine is about \$4,000 and the plane is about \$4,000. And if you want it to look as good as Don's, the paint job will run you about \$2,000. If you want one maybe Santa will bring you one. Ho! Ho! Ho!

This 1/4 scale pilot figure was made from a DGA kit, distributed by SIG. If you think it looks like Jack McEvoy you are wrong. According to Annette it is his evil brother Frank. Therefore if the Super Decathlon meets with a bad accident she does not have to worry about the guy in the pilot seat. Nice job Annette.





Above and below are a couple more of Jim Halbert's creations. As Jim believes that no one designs things as good as he can, both planes have considerable modifications. Think the Excide power glider has a longer nose and probably more polyhedral in the wing for stability. The bi-plane would have been a bare bones beauty, but now has balsa covered foam wings and balsa sheeted fuselage sides and cowling. Will try to get documentation of both maiden flights.
